This consists of steps starting from when the wood is delivered all the way through cutting pieces and assembly of the projects. There are many steps and pieces that go into the projects so all the boys have work together most often in teams in order to accomplish these tasks. The boys learn measuring skills, angles, machine usage, teamwork and following through with specific instructions to complete each task.
